Contracts with federal, state and county governments provide about three-fourths of the operating cost. The rest comes from individuals and churches throughout the country.*

*Buckhorn Children and Family Services is a validated mission of the Presbyterian Church (USA), in the Synod of the Living Waters and the Synod of the Covenant. Support and prayers of all persons of faith are welcomed and mission workgroups are hosted from many faith communities throughout the year.*

### **Residential Treatment Program**

*Buckhorn Children's Center is a 24-hour program that provides a highly structured environment for the severely emotionally disturbed child ranging in age from 8 to 21 years. A Comprehensive Individualized Treatment Plan is developed that may include individual, group and family therapy, individualized education, medical services, recreation, expressive and milieu therapy and psychiatric consultation. The residential campus is located in Buckhorn and provides services to males and females.*

### **Psychiatric Residential Treatment Facility**

**Campbell Lodge Boys' Home** is dedicated to the development of a residentially-based service system for at-risk youth and their families and served more than 50 children and their families during 2006

The CHANCE Program at Ponta Hall is a short-term, seven-day program for boys age 10 to 16 who have been discharged from psychiatric hospitalization, but are still in need of treatment before returning home. Ponte residents stay from three to six months, attend school in the Campbell County school system, and have the opportunity to work on personal control, family issues and behavioral changes across settings — including school, home and community. Parents and guardians of these young men join the family therapy team to enhance communications and understanding, and to tackle problems as a team. The program also includes a comprehensive 90-day home-based aftercare component.

Guild residents typically stay from one to two years, attend school in the Campbell County school system, and have weekly individual and group counseling. Family counseling is available when appropriate. Staff work to ensure that residents have the structure, stability, and routine

*needed to function productively at school and in the community.*

*Begun in 2006, Equine-Assisted Counseling (EAC) is a unique program offered to all residents. Current research in the neurosciences indicates that experiential therapies such as EAC are often preferable to traditional avenues for adolescents who don't have fully developed capacities for abstract thinking. The use of horses in treatment virtually eliminates the stigma of traditional talk therapy and creates a non-threatening environment for the boys to openly explore alternative means of addressing their feelings and behaviors.*
